Outreach Programs

Background

Rural Health West is the jurisdictional Fundholder for the Rural Health Outreach Services programmes. Administered on behalf of the Australian Government Department of Health (AGDoH), Rural Health West supports ear and hearing outreach services across Western Australia (WA) through the following Indigenous Australians' Health Programmes (IAHP):

- Healthy Ears Better Hearing, Better Listening (HEBHBL)
- Medical Outreach Indigenous Chronic Disease Program (MOICDP)
- Eye and Ear Surgical Support (EESS)
- Follow up Ear and Hearing Health Services (FEHHS)

The aim of each of the Outreach service delivery programs is to increase access to effective high quality, comprehensive, culturally appropriate, primary health care services for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples across WA. The Outreach programs also support visiting health professionals to provide upskilling activities to local workforce.

Outreach - upskilling support

Upskilling supports building a sustainable health workforce in regional, rural and remote locations and improves health outcomes in those communities.

Where possible and appropriate, Outreach health professionals are encouraged to provide educational and upskilling activities, of either a theoretical or clinical nature, to local medical and health professionals and, where appropriate, other members of the public (such as carers and teachers). Arrangements for formal upskilling activities must be developed in consultation with local health professionals and aim to complement existing training arrangements within the area.

Funding may be provided for supported procedural and non-procedural upskilling. The cost of the venue/facility/room hire can also be covered. Outreach programs will not cover the cost of allocation of points for Continuing Professional Development.

In addition, non-salaried private health professionals may claim an hourly rate, which is consistent with the applicable fee-for-service rates for the time required to present the agreed upskilling activity.

Rural Health West – Health Workforce Scholarship Program

The Health Workforce Scholarship Program (HWSP) is an initiative of the Australian Government Department of Health, administered in Western Australia by Rural Health West. The HWSP provides scholarships and bursaries to help health professionals in rural and remote Australia retain and enhance their skills, capacity and scope of practice. Eligible applicants include those providing primary health care services in Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Services (ACCHS), private or non-government health sector. The HWSP is available to health professionals located in, or providing services to, areas categorised as Modified Monash Model (MMM) 3-7 locations.

Please note: Health professionals providing primary health care services in an ACCHS can be located within an MMM 1-7 location.

HAPEE audiologists and community engagement officers can support and mentor local health professionals through the TAFE NSW EarTrain program.
